Investment objective

The Sub-Fund seeks to outperform the 25% MSCI World NR EUR + 25 MSCI Europe NR EUR + 50% Bloomberg Euro Govt Inflation Linked 1-10 years composite index calculated dividends reinvested, over the recommended investment period, while protecting the capital during adverse periods through opportunistic management and flexible asset allocation. Investors' attention is drawn to the fact that the management style is discretionary and integrates environmental, social / societal and governance (ESG) criteria.

To achieve its investment objective, the investment strategy is based on active discretionary management.











Portfolio managers comments

The markets interrupted their run of 5 consecutive monthly rises to end the month down -3.19% for the Eurostoxx 50, -4.16% for the S&P500 and -4.46% for the Nasdag.

This decline was triggered by disappointments on some quarterly publications for which expectations had been high, by the latest US inflation figures and by unstable geopolitical conditions against a backdrop of high valuations.

On the central bank front, the Fed's hopes of rate cuts have been thwarted by a macroeconomy that remains resilient and, above all, by persistently high inflation in the United States: the core PCE index, the Fed's preferred indicator of underlying price pressures, accelerated from 2.0% in Q4 2023 to 3.7% in Q1 2024.

Investors are now anticipating more than a single rate cut in November, while the ECB is expected to initiate its first rate cut in June.

In terms of publications, the best performers were the value sectors, with basic resources (+9.50%), energy (+4.90%) and banks (+2.88%).

The portfolio's 3 main contributors were Total Energies (solid results driven by the recovery in LNG demand in Asia), Carrier Global (solid 2024 guidance on the heat pumps segment) and Saint Gobain (confirmation of the "double-digit" operating margin guidance and a very constructive message from management for the year).

Publications from Microsoft (acceleration of the Azure cloud division), LVMH (a resilient FL&G segment and solid Selective Retailing business at Sephora), Schneider Electric (growth in Energy Management and Data Centres) and L'Oréal (strong European demand +12% on European sales vs. 7.4% consensus) were also welcomed by investors.

Our 3 main detractors were impacted by mixed results: Stellantis (volumes down more sharply against a backdrop of weak demand in Europe and an unexpected reset of the H1 operating margin to 10-11%), Sartorius (disappointing results due to weak Chinese demand and guidance at risk) and Uber (the share suffered from the rotation of styles towards value).

Publications from Meta (margin impacted by high capex related to AI), Air Liquide (low level of activity offset by a rise in prices) and ASML (disappointment on its Q2 guidance due to a low level of orders in Q1) also had an impact on performance.

Against this backdrop, DNCA Invest Evolutif recorded a fall of -3.24% compared with -1.06% for its benchmark index.

We have reduced our net exposure to equities to 55% by increasing our short positions in Eurostoxx50 (15%) and Nasdaq (4%) futures, which we will reduce in the next phases of excessive market consolidation.

Following the announcements, we sold our positions in Sartorius and BBVA and reduced our positions in Stellantis and STM. We added to our positions in JP Morgan, L'Oréal, Eaton and Saint Gobain, and participated in the IPO of Planisware, a French specialist in cloud solutions.

Like the equity markets, the European corporate credit indices recorded negative performances, with the Crossover (HY) widening by 14bp and the Main (IG) remaining stable.

We took advantage of the rise in sovereign markets to extend the fund's sensitivity to 3.50 by strengthening our French and Spanish inflation-linked bonds and participating in the Iliad (HY) 5.375% 2031 issue. The actuarial yield rose slightly to 4.09% at the end of the month.






Responsibility risk breakdown⁽¹⁾



Selectivity universe exclusion rate




Transition/CSR exposure(2)



Analysis methodology

We develop proprietary models based on our expertise and conviction to add tangible value in the selection of portfolio securities. DNCA's ESG analysis model, Above & Beyond Analysis (ABA), respects this principle and offers a rating that we control the entire construction. Information from companies is the main input to our rating. The methodologies for calculating ESG indicators and our responsible investor and engagement policy are available on our website by clicking here.

(1) The rating out of 10 integrates 4 risks of responsibility: shareholder, environmental, social and societal. Whatever their sector of activity, 24 indicators are evaluated, such as social climate, accounting risks, suppliers, business ethics, energy policy, quality of management.

(2) The ABA Matrix combines the Responsibility Risk and the Sustainable Transition exposure of the portfolio. It allows us to It allows companies to be mapped using a risk/opportunity approach.

Glossary

Beta. Measures the average extent to which a fund moves relative to the broader market. The beta of a market is 1. A fund with a beta of more than 1 moves on average to a greater extent than the market. A fund with a beta of less than 1 moves on average to a lesser extent. If beta is a minus number, it is likely that the stock and the market move in opposite directions

Convertible Bond. Hybrid securities that have both bond and equity characteristics. Convertible bonds make periodic interest payments like a bond, but bondholders also get an option to exchange their bonds for a specified number of shares of common stock. Convertible bonds typically carry lower coupon rates, thus reducing the corporation's cost of borrowing.

Correlation coefficient. The correlation coefficient is a measure of correlation. It is used to determine the relationship between two assets over a given period. A positive coefficient means that the two assets move in the same direction. Conversely, a negative coefficient means that the assets move in the opposite direction. The correlation or decorrelation can be more or less strong and varies between -1 and 1.

Delta. The delta of a position expresses the change in the price of an option when its underlying asset price varies. It corresponds to the derivative of the theoretical value of the option relating to the price of the underlying asset. **Maturity.** The time when a bond or other debt instrument is due to for redemption (is due to mature); or the length of time between the issue of such an instrument and the date it is

due for redemption (the maturity date).

Sensitivity. The sensitivity of a bond measures the change in its percentage value induced by a given change in interest rates

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Sharpe Ratio. A way of measuring the historical risk-adjusted return on an investment. It is the average previous return minus the risk-free return, divided by the standard deviation (a measure of risk that looks at the diversion of actual returns from expected returns).

Sharpe Ratio. The Sharpe ratio measures the excess return over the risk-free money rate of an asset portfolio divided by the standard deviation of that return. It is therefore a

measure of the marginal return per unit of risk. It is used to measure the performance of managers with different risk policies.

Tracking error. Tracking Error is a measure of how closely an investment portfolio follows the index against which it is benchmarked. It is the difference in the return earned by a portfolio and the return earned by the benchmark against which the portfolio is constructed. For example, if a bond portfolio earns a return of 5.15% during a period when the portfolio's benchmark (say, for example, the Lehman Brothers Index) produces a return of 5.06%, the tracking error is .09%, or 9 basis points.
