

Investment focus and suitability

The fund invests worldwide in mainly convertible bonds and bonds with warrants denominated in various currencies and issued and guaranteed by issuers from recognised countries. The investment aim of the fund is to achieve an above-average yield over the long term with simultaneous risk diversification. The currency risk is largely hedged.



The performance data for the period prior since 15.10.1993 corresponds to the performance data for the GAM Multibond - Global Convert Bond EUR, a fund with the same investment objectives and the same investment policy, and which was merged with the fund on 18.01.2018. The fund itself was launched upon this merger and did not have any previous performance history.

Past performance is not an indicator of current or future trends. The performance values refer to the net asset value and are calculated without the commission and costs incurred on issue, redemption or swapping (e.g. transaction and custody costs of the investor). The indications are based on figures denominated in EUR. 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Opportunities

The fund invests in a broadly diversified bond universe and seeks various opportunities for returns.

A highly qualified and experienced management actively manages the fund on the basis of a fundamental valuation approach. The objective is to identify the potential investments that, in the Investment manager's opinion, are most attractive and to generate interesting and profitable opportunities for investors.

The fund gives investors easy access to convertible bonds and bonds with warrants, which may offer attractive potential returns in various sectors.

The fund invests in bonds, which may be subject to significant fluctuations in value. Bonds are subject to issuer risk, credit risk and interest rate risk

The fund may invest in derivatives, which are subject to the risks of their underlying markets or underlying instruments as well as issuer risks and often involve higher risks than direct investments.

The fund may invest in securities of issuers that the market does not view as having good creditworthiness. These securities are subject to comparatively high volatility, and the possibility that they may even lose their value completely cannot be ruled out.

The fund may invest in assets denominated in various currencies, giving rise to exchange rate risks which may be hedged. If the currency in which the past performance is displayed differs from the currency of the country in which an investor resides, due to exchange rate fluctuations, the performance shown may increase or decrease if converted into the investor's local currency.

The fund can invest in convertible bonds and bonds with warrants. Convertible bonds are interest-bearing securities which give the holder the right to convert the bond into shares at a predetermined ratio during the conversion period.

Glossary

Alpha (Jensen's):Jensen's Alpha measures the performance of an investment (fund) in relation to its benchmark. A positive alpha means that the value of the fund has generated a higher return than the benchmark.

Benchmark (BM): An index that can be used by an investment fund as the basis of comparison for assessing the performance achieved.

Beta:the beta coefficient describes to what extent the price of a share tracks the value of an index, i.e. if the share performs better or worse than the market. Correlation: A statistic measurement which shows the linear relationship (or degree of parallel movement) between two series of figures, for example the performance of two equity investments.

Duration: Refers to the period of time that capital is tied into a monetary or bond investment or in other debt securities, and determines the sensitivity of the price to interest rate changes. Unlike residual maturity, the duration also takes into account interest payments and other inflows from invested capital.

Funds of Funds: These are investment funds which invest their fund assets in other target funds.

High water mark: The high water mark principle establishes a cap on or allows for a potential rise in performance fees. According to this principle, the investment fund manager only receives the relevant remuneration when the fund exceeds the highest level of return that it has ever achieved. Information ratio: The information ratio expresses the ratio of additional returns generated to the extra risk involved. The value generated can be used to evaluate active management.

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Modified duration: A risk indicator that measures the effect of price fluctuations on a bond issue or a portfolio of bond issues.

Residual maturity: Time remaining until a bond must be repaid.

Sharpe ratio: The Sharpe ratio (risk-adjusted performance) is generated by calculating the difference between the average annualised return and the risk-free return. The resulting figure is divided by the annualised standard deviation of the returns. The higher the Sharpe ratio, the better the fund performance in relation to the risk potential of its portfolio.

Total Expense Ratio (TER): The TER is a measure of the total annual expenses incurred by a fund and is expressed as a percentage. It allows an accurate

Tracking error: The tracking error measures the divergence between the return of a fund in relation to its benchmark.

Volatility: A risk indicator demonstrating the fluctuation range (for example of the price or return of a security or fund unit) over a defined period; volatility is most often calculated using standard deviation. The higher the volatility the greater the fluctuation range.

Yield to maturity: The yield to maturity is the average yield generated by an investment each year if it is held until expiry.

Yield to worst: The lowest potential rate of return an investor could receive on investment in a callable bond, assuming the bond does not go into default.

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
