### Investment policy

The investment objective of the fund is to achieve capital appreciation within defined risk parameters. The fund investments are primarily in bonds or corporate issuers domiciled or which carry out the bulk of their business activities in the United States. The fund aims to participate primarily in USD corporate bond markets while paying due attention to the following investment criteria: credit risk, liquidity and an adequate spread of risks. In order to achieve this objective the fund's assets shall be invested primarily in bonds (including zero bonds), other fixed-interest and floating-rate securities.

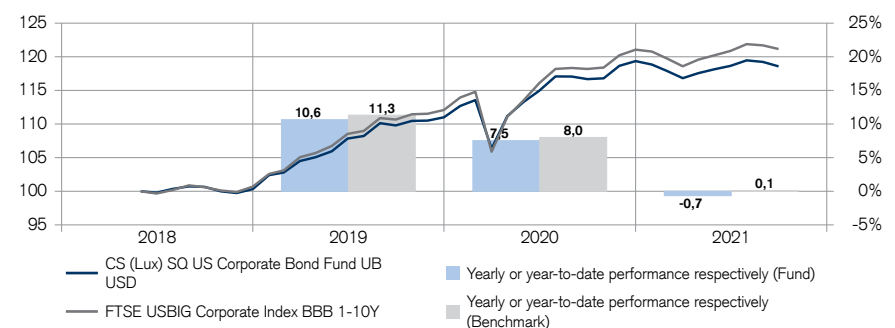

### Net performance in USD (rebased to 100) and yearly performance <sup>2)</sup>



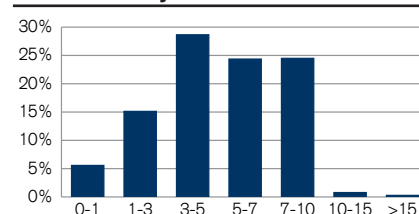

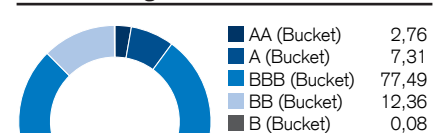

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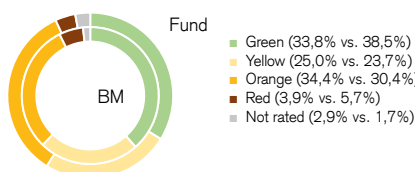

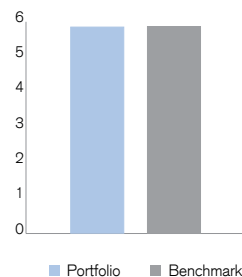

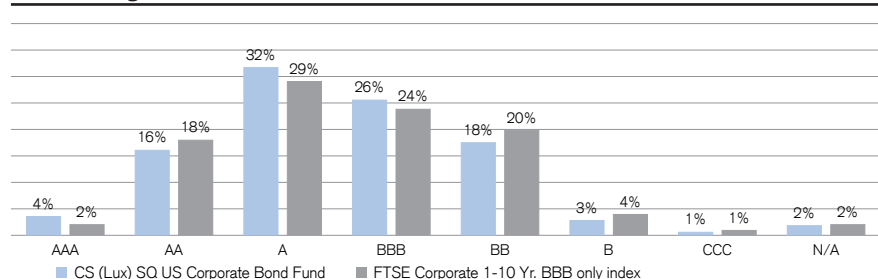
## Portfolio Summary <sup>7)</sup>

## ESG Rating in Percent vs Benchmark <sup>11)</sup>



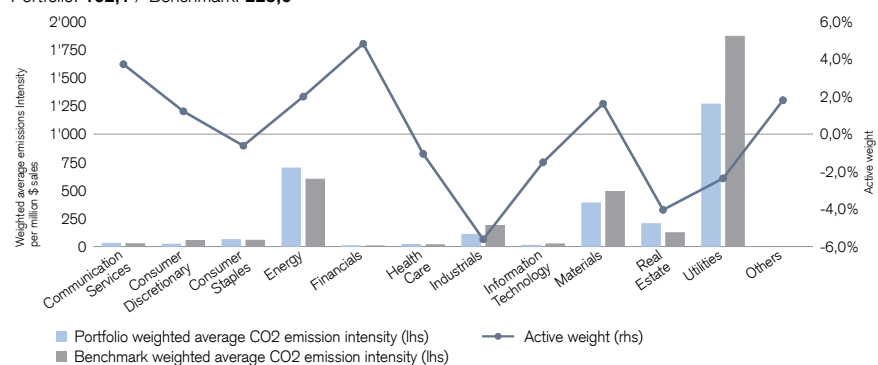

11) ESG Ratings represents the ESG Rating breakdown in percentage in an absolute view or relative to a benchmark.

12) Low Carbon Transition Score is based on a multi-dimensional risks and opportunities assessment and considers both predominant and secondary risks a company faces. The scale ranges from 0-10 (with 10 representing a potential leader) and is industry agnostic and represents an absolute assessment of a company's position vis-à-vis the transition. On a portfolio level, individual scores are aggregated and compared to the benchmark (if existent).

13) Carbon Intensities compares the weighted average emissions intensity per million \$ sales (broken down by GICS sector) between the portfolio and the benchmark. It also displays active GICS sector weights.

## Potential risks
