

HIGHLIGHTS

PrivilEdge – PPM America US Corporate Bond is an actively managed long-only fund invested in investment grade corporate bonds issued in the United States denominated in dollars. The fund is managed by PPM America, Prudential plc's fully owned asset management firm based in Chicago. The fund provides core exposure to the US corporate bond market and uses the Bloomberg Barclays US Corporate Index as a benchmark. The fund seeks to outperform the benchmark by exploiting market inefficiencies employing rigorous fundamental credit research and relative value analysis. The fund has the flexibility to invest up to 15% into structured finance securities (ABS, MBS and CMBS) and limits its active duration to +/- 1 year versus the benchmark.





TOP 5 LARGEST OVERWEIGHT AND UNDERWEIGHT INDUSTRIES



Credit Ratings: The credit ratings breakdown mentioned for convertible funds is a blend of ratings performed internally as well as ratings provided by external sources.

Risk and Reward Profile: This indicator (SRRI) represents the annualized historical volatility of the Sub-Fund over a 5-year period. Where there are less than 5 years worth of data, missing returns are simulated using an appropriate benchmark. The SRRI may change over time and should not be used as an indicator of future risk or returns. Even the lowest risk classification does not imply that the Sub-Fund is risk-free or that capital is necessarily guaranteed or protected.

Total Expense Ratio (TER): The total fees involved in managing and operating a fund. The TER included the annual management fee and other charges, for example legal, admin, and audit costs (source: annual audited reports or semi annual non audited reports). The Total Expense Ratio (TER) is calculated twice per year and is subject to change between calculation dates.

Volatility: A statistical measure of the fluctuations of a security's price. It can also be used to describe fluctuations in a particular market. High volatility is an indication of higher risk. Sharpe Ratio: A measure of risk-adjusted performance. The higher the ratio, the better riskadjusted performance has been.

Drawdown: A draw down is usually quoted as the percentage between the peak and trough of an investment during a specific period. It can help to compare an investment's possible reward to its risk.

Correlation: Correlation is a measure of how securities or asset classes move in relation to each other. Highly correlated investments tend to move up and down together while investments with low correlation tend to perform in different ways in different market conditions, providing investors with diversification benefits. Correlation is measured between 1 (perfect correlation) and -1 (perfect opposite correlation). A correlation coefficient of 0 suggests there is no correlation.

Tracking Error: A measure of how closely an investment portfolio follows the index against

Bond Floor: The lowest value that convertible bonds can fall to, given the present value of the remaining future cash flows and principal repayment. The bond floor is the value at which the convertible option becomes worthless because the underlying stock price has fallen substantially below the conversion value.

Delta: The ratio comparing the change in the price of the underlying asset to the corresponding change in the price of a derivative.

Premium: If a fixed-income security (bond) is purchased at a premium, existing interest rates are lower than the coupon rate. Investors pay a premium for an investment that will return an amount greater than existing interest rates.

Yield to Maturity: The rate of return anticipated on a bond if it is held until the maturity date.

Coupon: The interest rate stated on a bond when it's issued.

Modified Duration: This formula is used to determine the effect that a 100-basis-point (1%) change in interest rates will have on the price of a bond.

Average Duration: The average modified duration of the portfolio expressed in years. Expected Loss: Annual average expected loss to the portfolio expressed in percent. Attachment Point: The modelled probability of a negative portfolio return in any given year. FROC (Fixed Rate of Operational Costs): The Operational Costs cover expenses directly incurred by the Company ("Direct Costs)" and those resulting from the activities carried out by the Management Company on behalf of the Company ("Fund Servicing Costs"). Swinging Single Pricing (SSP): SSP is an adjustment to the NAV per share in consideration of subscription and redemption activity on a dealing day.
